## GALA "BOULEVARD DAY."

**Enterprising Hollywood Developers  
Will Entertain Next Saturday to  
Celebrate Inauguration of Great Work.**

"Boulevard" day will be celebrated at Hollywood next Saturday afternoon by the enterprising creators of the beautiful foothill suburb, keeping open house to all comers. The Los Angeles-Pacific Boulevard and Development Company, of which H. J. Whitley is president, has issued several hundred invitations to citizens of Los Angeles, who will be taken to Hollywood by special cars.

The occasion will be celebrative of the inauguration of work on the 100-foot Sunset boulevard, from Douglas street to the city limits, to connect with the boulevards already built, the \$100,000 contract having just been let. The pleasure pavilions on Whitley Heights will also be formally opened with a flag-raising. The celebration is intended to show the many improvements of the year, and advertise and extend the boulevard movement.

Automobiles and other conveyances will be on hand to give visitors rides over the smooth highways. In the pavilion on the heights, short speeches will be made by prominent citizens and there will be music throughout the afternoon. Mrs. H. J. Whitley, assisted by the club ladies of the valley, will entertain the Caluenga children.
