SCHOOL HATCHETS BURIED. HOLLYWOOD, Feb. 9.-Fifty residents of Hollywood met at the High School this evening to discuss proposed sites for the new grammar school. Three were proposed, all on Selma avenue, between Hudson street Highland avenue. The prices und \$2800 to \$3750, Philo ranged fram Beveridge presented a resolution, accepting the site offered by Mr. Chiapella, and which lies hear Hudson avenue, with a frontage of 310 feet on the north side of Selma avenue and 200 feet doep. The price is \$2800. This resolution was indorsed by H. J. Whitley, Mr. Eastman, Mr. Lyon. Beveridge and others, and was carried by practically a unanimous vote. It was the sentiment of the meeting that bonds be voted to the limit for the of as good an eight-room erection school building as money will build. The various speakers pledged themselves and the districts which they represented to work in harmony and to bury all school hatchets.

Wednesday evening the patrons of the district will meet at Druet Hall to ratify the action of the representatives of East and West Hollywood, and to instruct the school board as to the future policy of the district, as to the calling of an election and other mat-

ters. This afternoon the Union High School Board met and corrected a slight error in the call for the bond election which was to have been voted upon February 27, and set the time for the election as March 5. This call provides for the issuance of bonds to the amount of \$65,000, and is borne by the seven districts in the High School union.

If both these bond elections carry, this will provide Hollywood with a splendid new High School building and two grammar schools.
