TECOND PROJECTED HOLLYWOOD BOULEVARD.

THE ENTERPRISE SUCCESS OF NOW SEEMS ASSURED.

Aid by the County at Hand-Supérvisors Ask for Bids to Open Vermont Avenue from Fourth Street to Wilshire Boulevard.

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The second projected boulevard be-tween this city and Hollywood, the one by way of Vermont avenue, seems to be on the point of becoming an accom-plished fact. Liberal private subscr.p-tions and county ald promise to result in the completion of the route just laid out before the older course, planned to enter Los Angeles by way of Belevue avenue. However, determined spirits and large means are enlisted in each of the boulevard enterprises, and the con-nection of Los Angeles with her most favored subtrban garden spot by both routes at an early date is assured. The Supervisors yesterday asked for bids to open Vermont avenue from Fourth street to Wlishire boulevard, and to grade it from Wilshire boulevard to Temple street. It will be remembered that H. J. Whitley, about four years ago, took up the matter of building bouevaids in and around Hoilywood, which might some day be extended to a connection with Los Angeles, so as to furnish a continuous driveway for the clitzens of this city, and the thousands of tourns: a usenga yaley, and the building of about one more mile of boulevard with connect this city with that system. The Board of Supervisors has already advertised for bids for grading Ver-mont avenue from Wilshire boulevard to Temple street, and when they are submitted definite estimates can be made. Vermont avenue from Wilshire boulevard to Fourth street is yet unopened, but rights of way have been secured by Mr. Brotherton and others, and there will be no difficulty about opening it. From Fourth to Temple street, Vermont avenue is open, but not graded. From Temple street to Prospect avenue, Vermont avenue is already graded, and in fairly good condition. From this point to within about a quarter of a mile of Laurel Cañon, Prospect avenue, which is a broad and perfectly-graded boulevard, affords a continuos driveway of four miles. Sunset boulevard and the connecting cross streets in the Cahuenga Valley, which are all handsome driveways from 80 to 100 feet wide, will also be opened to the Los Angeles public when the Vermont-avenue gap, is closed, and they bring the total number of miles of boulevarde driveways is one of the broadest and most beautiful streets of the city. It is already graded as far west as Vermont avenue, and passes through a portion of the city which cannot fail to impress strangers most agreeably. West-

Iake Park, and the handsome residences of that locality, will be a portion of the views which this driveway will present. The efforts that have previously been made toward extending Prospect avenue to this city by way of the Lakeshore boulevard, the Sisters' Hospital and the Plaza, will not be relaxed by reason of the opening and boulevarding of Vermont avenue. On the contrary, those efforts will be pressed with redoubled vigor. Fifty teams are now at work daily on that extension, and H. J. Whitley, who, with the aid of Supervisor E. S. Field, Col. G. J. Griffith, the Los Angeles-Pacific Railroad Company, and others, has made possible present achievements in and around Hollywood, are pushing the development.
